Children in Year One and Year Two follow the National Curriculum which is taught through cross curricular themes wherever possible.

We hope this booklet shows you how children learn about R.E. and some of the content that they cover during their time at Waterthorpe.

Key Content of R.E. curriculum:

We follow the Sheffield Agreed Syllabus provided by SACRE (Standing Advisory Council for Religious Education).

The National Curriculum states the legal requirement that:

"Every state-funded school must offer a curriculum which is balanced and broadly based, and which:

- promotes the spiritual, moral, cultural, mental and physical development of pupils at the school and of society, and
- prepares pupils at the school for the opportunities, responsibilities and experiences of later life."

Teaching in our school will develop an increasing understanding of wide areas of RE subject knowledge, including the skills of:

- investigating religions and world views through varied experiences and disciplines;
- reflecting on and expressing their own ideas and the ideas of others with increasing creativity and clarity;
- becoming increasingly able to be reasonable in their responses to religions and world views.

The curriculum is broad & balanced with children learning about different religions including; Christianity, Islam & Judaism.



The children will experience visiting different religious establishments. This could include a Church, Mosque or a Cathedral.



We promote creative development through a range of visits, visitors and school activities.
